From the beginning, the story of NorthCross Church has been focused around the formation of authentic Christian community. During the past three years it's been a joy to watch our community flourish with an influx of new families. Our congregation has almost doubled in size! However we have also felt the pains of this growth in trying to find a seat on Sunday morning and dealing with classrooms that are not quite large enough for the growing number of children of all ages.

In a strategic effort to be good stewards of this growth and to realize our vision of becoming a church that reaches more families in Lake Norman, last spring we added to our staff an Assistant Pastor of Congregational Life and a Children's Ministry Director.

As Fall 2016 arrives we will continue the implementation of our strategic plan with the important funding phase. Throughout the summer a steering team of dedicated volunteers has been working behind the scenes to prepare NorthCross for NEXT.

NEXT is the name of our generosity initiative that kicks off in September. This will be a season focused on expanded giving over the next two years to fund the Next steps in our growth as a church community.

STRATEGIC PLAN SUMMARY

During the summer of 2015 we completed a strategic planning process named "Expanding the Story." It is a detailed road map to realize a vision of becoming a medium sized church. This plan identified key ministries within the church that were essential in a movement towards greater ministry excellence: Worship, Children's Ministry, Communication, Adult Life and Leadership Development, Outreach, Facilities. Of these six ministry priorities the session concluded that Worship, Children's Ministry and Facilities were the current priorities to our success.

This vision to become a medium-size church was the result of surveying the congregation of NorthCross. This centered around the question of vision and the characteristics of NorthCross

that our people loved the most and desired to maintain. It also addressed the areas of weakness in our church that our congregation wanted to see strengthened and improved.

The conclusion of this feedback was the desire to maintain the culture of intimacy and the value of our strong relational community while at the same time moving towards excellence in key ministries. To accomplish this goal we decided that a church of 250-300 people was as large as we could grow without losing the intimacy of community that we all love while also providing the resources to realize greater excellence in ministry. And with this size congregation we could renew our vision to plant churches and establish kindred worshipping communities throughout Lake Norman.

FACILITY

Though we have always been a church that believed in investing in people over property, we realize that our present facility has been and will continue to be a limiting factor in growth.

The Next Facility will be able to accommodate 300 people in worship and equally important provide space to grow our expanding ministry to families.

Our strategic plan prioritized the hiring of two additional staff members to ensure the leadership needed to support strategic areas of ministry.

NEXT will continue to help fund our newly hired team members: the Assistant Pastor of Congregational Life who oversees the development of key ministries; and the part-time director of Children's Ministry to oversee the development of a ministry that facilitates spiritual formation and growth for our children.

OUTREACH

Two years ago we began a faith promise initiative that resulted in \$50,000 for outreach and missions. Through NEXT our commitment is to grow not only resources to benefit the ministry of NorthCross, but expand our giving to outreach that enable us to partner with more ministries that are growing God's kingdom in the Lake Norman area and around the globe.

THE GENEROSITY LADDER


Much like the sacrificial givers, these givers make a lifetime or long-term commitment to evaluate and govern their financial decisions through the lens of generous giving.

These givers decide to give something on a consistent basis. This requires planning and discipline to give regularly.


These givers decide to give for the first time and trust God with their gift.

YOUR STORY

1 JOHN 4:9-12

⁹ In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. 10 In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. 11 Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. 12 No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.

- * How does John describe God's generosity to us?
- * In what specific ways has God has been generous in demonstrating his love for me personally?
- * Can you think of a time when God was generous with you in one or more of the following areas? Spiritually - Relationally - Circumstantially - Materially
- * Are there specific ways that God has used the people at NorthCross to be generous to you?

YOUR WORLD

2 SAMUEL 24:24

²⁴ But king David said to Araunah, "No, but I will buy it from you for a price. I will not offer burnt offerings to the LORD my God that cost me nothing." So David bought the threshing floor and the oxen for fifty shekels of silver.

Leading up to this story, David displays a trust in physical strength through his ordering of a census of his people, specifically asking how many fighting men he had (2 Sam. 24:1-10; 1 Chr. 21:1). As a result, God punished David through a pestilence on the land, which killed 70,000 people; then the Lord had mercy and stopped the judgment. David was advised to build an altar and sacrifice to the Lord for having mercy and removing the pestilence, and he did, but the section of land desired for the altar was owned by someone else. The owner insisted on simply giving, or donating, the land to the king for the purpose of sacrificing to the Lord. Verse 24 (printed above) is David's answer.

READ ALSO: MARK 4:14-20

- * How was the subject of money handled or discussed in your home growing up? How is it handled or discussed in your home now (in your adult life)?
- * Are there specific things you're being told by Satan, by society or by yourself about how to handle wealth that seem to contradict what God says of wealth? Do these things tend to choke out or enhance what God wants to do in your life? How?
- * In 2 Samuel 24:24, how does David's response relate

to your normal attitude when giving something to God?

- * What significant experiences, people or teachings have influenced my thinking and attitudes about generosity?
- * Are there specific ways that God has used the people at NorthCross to be generous to you?
- * What, if anything, gets in the way of me having a generous heart?



>> YOUR FATHER

ROMANS 8:31-32

³¹ What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³² He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?

MATTHEW 19:28-30

Jesus said to them, "I tell you the truth, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man sits on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. 29 And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or fields for my sake will receive a hundred times as much and will inherit eternal life. 30 But many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first." * Discuss the idea of "sacrifice" in Romans 8:31-32.

- * Based on our understanding of sacrifice (i.e. giving up something, loss that creates a void or gap for something greater, etc.), how was giving up Jesus a "sacrifice" for God? Can God feel the burden of sacrifice?
- * Why would God undergo the burden of sacrifice?
- * What does Matthew 19:28-30 say about the result of sacrifice for the sake of Jesus?
- * To what extent have my thoughts and attitudes on generosity been guided by God's Word and the Holy Spirit?

- * Do you believe your giving is a meaningful act of worship? Why or why not?
- * What would it look like for me to live as God's adopted child who is one day going to inherit the entire earth?



YOUR HEART

MATTHEW 18:21-35

²¹ Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times.

²³ "Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants.

²⁴ When he began to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents. ²⁵ And since he could not pay, his master ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made.

²⁶ So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him, the master of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸ But when that same servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii, and seizing him, he began to choke him, saying, 'Pay what you owe.' ²⁹ So his fellow servant fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' ³⁰ He refused and went and put him in prison until he should pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their master all that had taken place. ³² Then his master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ And should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy

on you?' ³⁴ And in anger his master delivered him to the jailers, until he should pay all his debt. ³⁵ So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

2 CORINTHIANS 8:9

For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich.

- * What are the potential dangers or pitfalls for you emotionally and spiritually of having material things and increased wealth? Do they activate any idols for you?
- * What giving experiences time, talent, treasure have brought you the most joy? Has one of these brought me more joy than the others? Why is that? What if anything does this suggest about God's purposes for me?

- * From 2 Corinthians 8:9, describe the work of Jesus and what it means for you.
- * Have I asked God why He has provided me what He has materially and how He wants me to use it? Do I do this consistently?
- * Are there things in my life I need to let go of in order to create space for others? For God?

- 1 THESSAL ONIANS 2:19-20
- ¹⁹ For what is our hope, our joy, or the crown in which we will glory in the presence of our Lord Jesus when he comes? Is it not you? 20 Indeed, you are our glory and joy.* How does John describe God's generosity to us?
- * In 1 Thessalonians 2:19-20, what was Paul's primary investment during his life, what he referred to as his "crown?" Based on his expressed value in these things, what was Paul willing to give up in order to gain such a "crown?"
- * What do your spending habits point to concerning the priorities for your family?
- * Have you thought about God's will for you when it comes to giving both spiritually and financially to

- others? Do you see your assets as a sacred trust from God?
- * What are you modeling concerning handling material resources and living simply? To whom are you modeling this?
- * How intentional have I been developing strategies to leave behind not only a financial legacy to my loved ones, but also a spiritual one?
